THE MEANING OF THE SERVICE

Reader 2: As we prepare our hearts, minds, and bodies for this holy season of Advent, we are preparing ourselves for the coming of our Messiah; an infant, born of the Blessed Virgin. Advent means "coming." Christians have celebrated Advent for centuries, as a time of waiting and anticipation of the birth of the Savior at Christmas. The Advent season is a time for prayer, reflection, and preparation, but its mood is one of hope.

Reader 1: The hanging of the greens service involves you, the children of the Messiah, and our prayers are the spoken words, the hymns, and the decorations which will give extra meaning to your personal and communal preparation for Christ's birth.

THE BLESSING OF THE ADVENT WREATH

Reader 2: Prophets of the Old Testament foretold the coming of the Messiah, and now that promise is coming to fulfillment with the birth of the Christ Child. Now is the time for us to prepare – for the promise of God always remains. The circular shape of the wreath is symbolic of God's unending love for all his creation. The candles on the wreath are symbolic of God's light. The light grows brighter each passing week as the time draws close to our Savior's birth.

Lay Leader: Christ came to bring us salvation and has promised to come again. Let us pray that we may be always ready to welcome Him.

People: Come, Lord Jesus.

Lay Leader: That the keeping of Advent may open our hearts to God's love, we pray to the Lord.

People: Come, Lord Jesus.

Lay Leader: That the light of Christ may penetrate the darkness of sin, we pray to the Lord.

People: Come, Lord Jesus.

Lay Leader: That this wreath may constantly remind us to prepare for the coming

of Christ, we pray to the Lord.

Lay Leader: That the Christmas season may fill us with peace and joy as we strive

to follow the example of Jesus, we pray to the Lord.

May the wreath and its light be a sign of Christ's promise to bring us salvation. May He come quickly and not delay. We ask this through

Christ our Lord.

SANCTUARY WREATHS

Reader 1:

As you look around our sanctuary you see many wreaths. As you focus on the one being held, you see the simple circle of evergreen branches. The circle signifies a life without end, the eternal kingdom of Jesus, the Christ. Christmas greens point to deep, rich meanings of the season: laurel and bay symbolize victory and triumph; yew and cypress stand for eternal life; mistletoe symbolizes peace; and the prickly leaves of the holly are symbols of the crown of thorns.

The wreath is hung.

CHRISMON TREE

Reader 2: The use of the pine and cedar is generally believed to be of German origin and ascribed to Martin Luther. Remembering his tender interest in children and the nativity, the inspiration may well have proceeded from him. The great reformer, it is said, wandered out one Christmas Eve and became entranced with the wonder and beauty of the starry sky. Looking up, Luther thought of Him "who for me and our salvation, came down from heaven." On his return home, Luther set up a tree for his children and decorated it with candles to remind us that the Christ Child came to earth as the Light of the World.

Lay Leader: My brothers and sisters, amidst signs and wonders, Christ Jesus was born in Bethlehem of Judea. His birth brings joy to our hearts and enlightenment to our minds. With this tree, decorated and adorned, may we welcome Christ among us. May its lights guide us to the perfect light. Let us ask God to send His blessing upon us and upon this sign of our faith in the Lord.

People: Lord, give light to our hearts.

Lay Leader: That the Church may always reflect the joy of Jesus Christ who enlightens our hearts, let us pray to the Lord.

People: Lord, give light to our hearts.

Lay Leader: That this tree of lights may remind us of the tree of glory on which Christ accomplished our salvation, let us pray to the Lord.

People: Lord, give light to our hearts.

Lay Leader: That the joy of Christmas may always be in our homes, let us pray to the Lord.

People: Lord, give light to our hearts.

Lay Leader: That the peace of Christ may dwell in our hearts and in the world, let us pray to the Lord.

We praise You for the light of Israel; the Law, the prophets, and the wisdom of the Scriptures. We praise you for Jesus Christ, Your Son: He is Emmanuel, God-withus, the Prince of Peace, who fills us with the wonder of Your love. Lord God, let your blessing come upon us as we illumine this tree. May the light and cheer it gives be a sign of the joy of salvation. We ask this through Christ our Lord.

People: Amen.

HANGING OF CHRISMONS

Reader 1: Since the mid 1960's, New Jerusalem has designed, made and displayed chrismons. What exactly is a Chrismon? "Chrismon" is a combination of the words "Christ" and "monogram," and means "symbols of Christ." The most important aspect of a Chrismon ornament is its ability to share Christ's story, His identity, His story, and of the Holy Trinity. All Chrismon ornaments are made in white and gold to symbolize the purity and majesty of the Son of God.

The chrismons' themes come from early Christian symbols, the Bible and church histories. You'll notice that we only use tiny white lights on the tree, which point to Christ, the "Light of the World". We'll now hear some of these Chrismon stories.

Individuals will come forward and share their Chrismon stories.

THE BETHLEHEM STAR

Reader 2: Under the lights of the shining star, the announcement of the birth of Christ was made. The star proclaimed the joy with unfading brightness that was to last forever. There was a star in the East on Christmas morn, leading to the place of birth of the Savior.

The star is lit.

THE POINSETTIA

Reader 1: In many churches, you will see arrangements of poinsettias. The poinsettia, a winter flowering plant, symbolizes eternal life and the birth of Christ. This beautiful plant has a cluster of small yellow flowers that spring forth from among crimson leaves. The crown of yellow flowers reminds us of Him who was born the infant King. The star-shaped formation of the leaves reminds us of the guiding star of Bethlehem, which was shone at that first Christmas. The crimson color of the leaves symbolizes the fact that the Babe of Bethlehem became the Savior of the world as Christ shed His blood upon the cross of Calvary. The white poinsettia reminds us of the purity of Christ.
